Nationally, 80.8% of National 5 candidates were awarded A to C grades. At Higher level, the number of pupils getting an A to C pass was 78.9% and Advanced Higher, A to C attainment was 33.7%.

Fees

- The Glasgow Academy fees are determined annually by the Governors of The Glasgow Academicals' War Memorial Trust.
- School fees include all curricular lessons and text books. Lunch is also included in our Prep School fees.

Payment of fees

- School payments may be paid by Direct Debit at the discretion of The Glasgow Academicals' War Memorial Trust, in ten monthly instalments on the first banking day of each month, as specified in the Fee Notices, from 1st August to 1st May inclusive.
- Parents/carers of new pupils who wish to pay by Direct Debit will have received a Mandate with their enrolment forms.
- Parents who wish to change from paying their fees termly to the Direct
 Debit system should contact the Administration Centre and a Mandate will be forwarded to them.
- Fees can be paid via our online shop.

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Help with fees

The Glasgow Academy is a great place to develop your sporting, musical, artistic or other talents.

The Academy is able to offer help with fees through the generosity of its former pupils, parents and friends. Bursaries are means-tested according to family income and financial position.

Help with fees (10–100%) may be awarded at entry to Prep 7 and to all years in the Senior School, based on evidence of financial need and entrance test results. Help with fees may also be awarded to existing pupils in Prep 7 and in the Senior School in cases of demonstrable financial need. It is not currently available below Prep 7 because of the level of need for bursaries in Prep 7 and in the Senior School.

Families applying for help with fees will be asked to supply information about their financial circumstances, including assets and income, in confidence. By way of guidance, we are unlikely to be able to help parents whose combined income currently exceeds £65,000 if one child is to be educated or £75,000 if two children require financial assistance, or where there are significant assets.

In order to ensure fairness and enable the school to prioritise help, bursary applications should be submitted prior to the January entrance exam or—for existing pupils—by mid-May each year.

No difference is made between those children getting help with fees and those whose parents are paying full fees, and there is no public statement of the award of help with fees. All help with fees is reassessed annually, and therefore might rise or fall, but will normally continue at a similar level as long as the child enrolled at The Academy, provided there is no significant change in the family's financial situation.

Applications are now open for August 2023 entry.

Total means-tested bursaries awarded in the academic year 2022/23 amounted to £1,038,881, which is 5.5% of the school's total fee income. In total, 118 pupils received a bursary, representing 13% of the school roll eligible for a bursary (P7 to S6).

To make an application to The Glasgow Academy, scan the QR code above and complete our online application form.

- Our entrance assessments for Nursery and Kindergarten take place throughout the year at Kelvinbridge, Milngavie and Newlands.
- Children whose birthdays are on or between:
- 1st March and 31st August are eligible for a place subject to readiness assessment in the autumn term.
- 1st September and 28nd/29th February are eligible for a place subject to readiness assessment in the spring term.
- Entrance assessments for Prep 1-3 are held in January of each year. Our entrance exams for Prep 4 through to Senior 3 are held each year at the end of January at Kelvinbridge.
- Like all independent schools in the West of Scotland, we offer places in February after the Entrance Exam.
- Occasionally we have vacancies later in the year—and it is always worth checking availability with us on 0141 342 5494.
- The Academy will always try to make places available for siblings of existing pupils, unless it becomes apparent during the entrance procedures that admitting them to the school would not be in their best interest. We would only reach such a conclusion by discussing it openly with parents.
